

# Super argument team!

#### **Metacognitive skill targeted:**

This exercise will help you become better writers and super effective at working in groups. Through it, you will learn to:

- **plan:** before you start writing, you'll think about what you want to achieve and how to do it;
- monitor: you'll check if you're doing well, if you're writing as needed, and if you're collaborating effectively;
- **evaluate:** you'll assess if your text is good, what went great, and what could be improved;
- **revise:** you'll think about what to do to write even better next time and work even better as a team.

Age group: 11-12 years old

**Duration:** 40 minutes

#### Materials needed:

- · completed text created together;
- printed worksheet;
- writing materials (pen, pencil).





#### **Activity description**

You will reflect on two important things:

- Is your text super? You'll check if what you've written is well-thought-out and convincing.
- How did you work in the group? You'll think about whether you collaborated well and what you can do to make it even better next time!

#### Instruction

You can only perform this task after you and your colleagues have written a paper that you will later want to jointly evaluate to see how you did and how you worked together.

### Step 1: Our text - What did we do well?

First, as a whole group, look at the text you created together. Consider:

- Is it well-structured?
- Are the arguments strong and convincing?
- Is everything clear? Do we understand what you try to convey?

Answer the questions by choosing: "Yes," "No," or "Partially". This will quickly show you what went great and what still needs work.

### Step 2: Our teamwork - What went well?

Now, think about how you worked together.

- Did you get along well?
- Did you tell each other what you were thinking?
- Did everyone know what they needed to do?





#### Step 3: What can we do better next time?

After you've thought about everything, it's time to plan!

- Identify specific things you can improve in the text.
- Think about what to do to collaborate better as a group.

#### **Step 4: Conclusions for the future!**

Finally, reflect on what you've learned.

- What was the most important lesson for you?
- What rules will you set for yourselves for the future to write even better texts and work even better as a team next time?

### **Useful tips**

By regularly checking your texts and your teamwork, you'll quickly learn how to improve.

Finally, it would be good to discuss this with the whole class. This way, everyone will learn from each other and become true masters at writing texts and working in groups!
